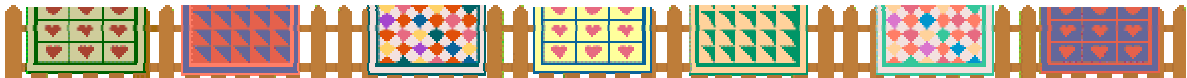

Special Report – Judy Elliott

What the heck is a “Swap”? Webster’s defines “SWAP” as “*the act or process of exchanging one thing for another*”. In the case of quilters, swaps can include the exchange of blocks, fabric, or even the quilt’s actual completion, as in round robins.

Block swaps and trades depend on the guidelines and instructions provided by the organizer. It is these guidelines that form the foundation and rules of the block swap. Guidelines can be general, simple instructions such as “make a basket block in any technique, 9 inch finished size” or a theme such as “rabbits” which leaves a lot of room for developing some fun, creative blocks. Do you want to do appliqué, paper piecing, patchwork, fused, batik fabrics, reproduction fabrics...and so on. Simple instructions can leave questions that the participant must answer for themselves (what colors, what techniques, how detailed, etc.) which can result in a wonderful variety in the blocks exchanged. It also forces the creative juices of the block recipients – how do you put together appliqué batiks with paper pieced reproductions or how to put together blocks of significantly differing prints? Participants of swaps with limited guidelines and instructions should feel comfortable with not knowing what will arrive while feeling excited about the possibilities!

Other swaps have more specific instructions to provide more guidelines for the participants. These instructions can be as formal as instructions about washing the fabric before sewing to specific color placements on blocks, such as a “9 inch log cabin block with burgundy in the middle and rotating colors of dark navy and light greens, each fabric being tone-on-tone or reading as solids, no two color prints” Specific instructions like these do increase the likelihood that the blocks will all look the same, although some surprises still do occur.

So, overall, the instructions for a swap depend on what the final outcome is to be and the participants involved. When four quilters are swapping blocks, they can maybe work with less guidelines; however, if 24 quilters are exchanging blocks, more guidelines may be a necessity to get the task done.

Some rules do apply though and should be remembered whenever doing a swap:

*Try to use good quality fabrics. We all get fabrics from Wal-Mart at times, but with swaps, participants should try to use better quality fabrics; having participants use better quality fabrics increases the ability of the blocks to better blend together. By this I mean, shrinkage, raveling, thread counts, etc are more similar, resulting in an overall better finished product.

- Depending on the size of the finished product, you still need to make all the required blocks. For example, if the finished quilt has 24 blocks, you still need to make 24 blocks. You may exchange away 20 of those blocks, but you will get 20 blocks back from your other participants.
- Have fun.

So, now that we have some basic information about swaps, why do we swap? Are we just not happy with our own fabrics or blocks? It obviously doesn't save time as we still need to do the same number of blocks as if we did it our self. So what's the draw to doing a swap?

Personally, I like swaps because it forces me out of my standard quilting mode. If left alone, I tend toward particular styles and fabric choices. Swaps have forced me to broaden my view of quilts and look at fabrics and blocks with new eyes. They force me to develop other quilting skills to keep up with the other participants. I don't tend toward watercolor quilts but completing a watercolor exchange has made me learn those skills; I may never make a watercolor quilt for myself, but I fully understand the workmanship and skill that goes into them. The same for brights – completing an exchange with neon bright colors has created a new appreciation for this color palette that has carried over to other quilts I've since made.

Swaps bring us together as quilters. They are opportunities to get to know other quilters around a shared fun task. They can establish new friendships. When can anyone have too many friends?

Swaps are always fun!

Now that everyone has read up on swaps and exchanges...let's take the plunge and have our first block exchange as a guild!!

This will be a **BLOCK LOTTERY**, Which is a variety of an exchange. For a block lottery, you can make as many blocks as you like. Everyone who made blocks puts their name in a hat. If you make 5 blocks, your name would go in 5 times; if you make 1 block, your name goes in once; you make 25 blocks, your name goes in 25 times. Get the picture? Depending on how industrious you choose to be depends on your chances to win. One name is drawn and that person is the winner of all the blocks. Now, if we end up with 50 blocks, we can draw for more winners, so that spreads the chances around even more.

The block parameters are as follows:

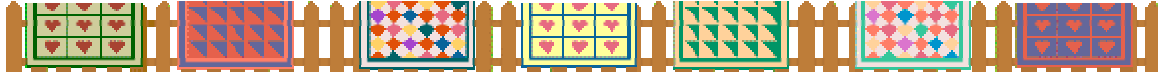
9 inch finished block (which means 9 ½ inches when you include the seam allowances)

Nine-Patch pattern in reds, whites, and blues that generally read as solid-ish colors. (We thought we would be patriotic since it is July)

Colors should be in middle and corners, with the side squares white. If you choose to use all three colors in one block, consider using the red in the middle point, and the blues on the corner points.

That's it! Once you make your blocks, remember to bring them to the July 20th meeting. We will have a table to drop off blocks and sign up for the drawing, which will be done during the meeting that night. So, someone should be able to go home with the makings of a great patriotic quilt when they leave that night.
